Keynote speakers Jackie Peterson and Aletheia Wittman will lead an interactive discussion. Last year, a collective of museum workers came together to address specific challenges facing museums and cultural organizations in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic and calls for social justice following the murder of George Floyd. The group, made up of representatives from seven unique museum equity-centered projects, pooled their strengths and resources together in a collective effort to build a field-wide dialogue, which culminated in a virtual event titled "Collective Liberation."

Jackie and Aletheia are Pacific Northwest-based cultural heritage workers who joined this nationwide coalition to push the conversation in the field to focus on collective liberation. Conference attendees are encouraged to join the conversation to discuss how coalition organizing can help us manifest the change we wish to see in the field.

This interactive keynote presentation will take place on Tuesday morning, September 14, 2021.

This meet up is free to attend, but you must register to receive log in details.



Preparing for the US Semiguincentennial

The US will commemorate its 250th (Semiquincentennial) anniversary in 2026. The American Association for State and Local History (AASLH) created *Making History at 250: A Field Guide for the Semiquincentennial* to help the history community prepare for 2026.

The Semiquincentennial offers an opportunity for museums not only to transform *what* they share with their audiences, but to reinvent *how* they serve their local communities, repositioning themselves as a vital civic resource. Museums can serve as critically important forums, helping visitors and community members hone their ability to listen with empathy, discuss ideas with humility, engage in difficult conversations, and strengthen the other civic skills required to collectively solve societal challenges. Although many museums have invested time and resources in community engagement over the past decade, the Semiquincentennial presents a chance for more transformational change across our field.

Inviting local, state, and federal elected officials and their staff members into your museum is a powerful way to show them the unique work museums do – from world-class exhibitions to working with local students and community members on critical life skills. As the world adjusts to new realities and ways of doing business caused by COVID-19, federal, state, and local legislators are eager to connect with the constituents and communities they represent across all available platforms and venues.

Whether your museum is open or preparing to safely re-open, and as elected officials begin to resume in-person events and meetings with constituents, AAM encourages museums to take advantage of impactful in-person, virtual, or telephone opportunities to connect with legislators. With the 117th Congress underway, it is critical that museum advocates continue to make the case for federal, state and local support for museums to legislators.

Applications open for Oregon Heritage MentorCorps assistance

The MentorCorps is a trained group of volunteers with professional experience in collections care, emergency management, and non-profit management. Its members are ready to help your organization get the guidance, training, and tools it needs to get the job done.

Those requesting free mentor assistance will be matched with a mentor based on factors such as geography and skills and abilities. Mentors are assigned to organizations for a period of nine months and assistance may be in person, virtual, or by phone depending on distance and type of projects.
