
Sweatober to help end unpaid internships

Sweatober is the National Emerging Museum Professional Network's (NEMPN) inaugural event to work towards the end of unpaid internships in the museum field.

Unpaid internships can lead to long-lasting pay inequities. According to a study by the National Association of Colleges and Employers, students who participated in unpaid internships had lower job offer rates and were offered up to \$10,500 less in salary for their first paid positions.

The funds raised by the Sweatober initiative will go into a national internship stipend pool, and will help NEMPN launch its Dreamweavers program to give internship coordinators the tools to transform their unpaid internship programs into paid learning experiences.
