March 2023 meet up in Portland

We presented our first in-person OMA conference since 2019

Our 2023 Annual Conference, *Bending the Rules*, was held in beautiful Bend. We presented one preconference workshop, Conversation with Funders, 12 sessions, a keynote speaker, and fun evening activities. We had 93 registrants, the largest attendance for an OMA conference to date.

We couldn't have done it without our local museum collaborators. On Sunday the <u>Deschutes Historical Museum</u> hosted the OMA board meeting, conference registration, preconference Workshop, and walking tours of Bend. The <u>High Desert Museum</u> opened their museum to attendees for our evening reception on Monday.

We conducted an evaluation and found that overall, respondents enjoyed the sessions and keynote speaker, and learned something to help them take concrete steps.

We had nine sponsors, for a total of \$7,000 in sponsorships (see page 2 in the program). Thank you sponsors!

Plans for 2024

We will hold our 2024 Annual Conference in Coos Bay September 8-10 at The 2024 conference will feature preconference activities and two full days of presentations, an increase from previous conferences of one and a half days.





We advocated for the Oregon museums community

In 2023 we boosted our advocacy work by writing letters to legislators, adding resources to our advocacy section of the website, and conducting a funding needs survey.

We sent strongly-worded letters to:

- The House Committee on Economic Development and Small Business supporting HB 2459 for additional COVID recovery funds
- The full Oregon Legislature expressing disappointment with how little support the Arts and Culture sector received in the 2023 session

We added resources to our <u>advocacy webpage</u>, including a new feature: <u>Request a letter of support from OMA</u>. This is good for your museum and business grants and for directing OMA's attention to local issues.

In conjunction with Representative Kevin Mannix's office, we conducted a funding needs survey in late 2023. Thank you to the museums that responded. We received 65 responses from 21 counties identifying a total of \$56 million in needs. Two-thirds of identified needs came from outside of the Portland metro area. Over 80% of the needs identified were for staff or facility support. While we are finalizing next steps in the legislative process, the information we collected will be invaluable to share in aggregate on other advocacy fronts.
